# Minnesota Gets \$60.5M in Historic Settlement with JUUL and Altria

Attorney General Keith Ellison announced the details of Minnesota's settlement with JUUL Labs, Inc. and Altria at a press conference on May 17. The state will receive \$60.5 million over seven years, which is the highest per capita of any state that has sued JUUL to date. The sum exceeds what JUUL made in Minnesota between 2015 and 2021.

After attorney's fees and other litigation costs, the state will receive about \$43 million. A bill to dedicate the funds toward commercial tobacco prevention and education passed in the final Health and Human Services omnibus bill. In addition to the money, the state will receive over

internal documents from JUUL. The settlement also prohibits JUUL from marketing its products to youth in Minnesota and requires the company to accurately report the nicotine content of its products.

Two young people spoke at the press conference: Claire Hering, a Hopkins High School graduate who also spoke when the state announced the lawsuit in 2019, and Katy Johnson, a current University of Minnesota student and ANSR youth advocate. Claire stated, "I'm hopeful that these resources can, and will, do good in Minnesota." Katy shared about her experience battling nicotine addiction facilitated by JUUL products as a young teenager.

This historic settlement is a victory for the state and harkens back to the landmark tobacco settlement of the late 1990s. In 1998, former Attorney General Skip Humphrey and Blue Cross Blue Shield of Minnesota settled with Big Tobacco for \$6.5 billion after accusing the industry of misrepresenting the dangers of smoking. Now, almost exactly 25 years later, the state is holding JUUL accountable for similar charges. As Katy said, "Young people and vulnerable populations really needed someone to take a stand and say 'no more' for the things susceptible minds might not be able to say 'no' to."

#### **ANSR Staff Present at ToPCon**

Many ANSR staff had the opportunity to present at the second annual ToPCon conference in early May. This national, virtual conference focuses on emerging topics in commercial tobacco prevention and serves as a site for dialogue around prevention best practices, policy strategies and more. This year's theme was "The Future of Best and Promising Practices."





# Marijuana Legalization: What You Should Know

On May 30, 2023, Governor Tim Walz signed the 321-page bill HF 100 into law, making Minnesota the 23rd state to legalize recreational marijuana. Here are some important details to know about the bill regarding cannabis use, sales and possession:











No smoking/vaping where prohibited by the MN Clean Indoor Air Act, effective July 1, 2023



No smoking/vaping nonmedical cannabis in multifamily housing, effective March 1, 2025



No use while operating or in a motor vehicle, effective July 1, 2023



No smoking or vaping near minors, including in schools, effective July 1, 2023

## ALMAS Educates Local Leaders about Smoke-Free Housing

This spring, students in the ALMAS (Anglos Latinos Motivated to Succeed) group at Two Rivers High School teamed up with ANSR's Live Smoke Free program and Tobacco-Free Alliance to educate local

leaders about the importance of smoke-free housing policies. Students learned about the issue in February when Live Smoke Free talked with the group about secondhand smoke in multi-unit housing and shared results from a 2021 smoke-free housing survey of West St. Paul residents.

In May 2023, ALMAS invited local decision makers to an educational session at Two Rivers High School. Students gave a presentation and talked with leaders from West St. Paul and Mendota Heights about the need for city leaders to take action to protect residents from secondhand smoke in multi-unit housing.

## **Donor Spotlight: Why I Support ANSR**

#### Dr. A. Stuart Hanson



Dr. Hanson led a remarkable career dedicated to commercial tobacco prevention.

Dr. Arthur Stuart Hanson is a long-term supporter of ANSR and a dedicated public health advocate. His tobacco prevention work and numerous policy achievements have made, and continue to make, Minnesota a healthier place for all.

Dr. Hanson helped develop the nation's first comprehensive plan to reduce the harms of tobacco—the Minnesota Plan for Nonsmoking and Health—in the 1980s. In 1984, he piloted the formation of the Minnesota Smoke-Free 2000 Coalition, bringing together health workers, advocacy groups and public health. The coalition led the tobacco control movement for the next two decades under his leadership.

When the coalition was replaced by the tobacco settlement-funded Minnesota Partnership for Action Against Tobacco (MPAAT, renamed Clear Way Minnesota) and its supporting coalition, Smoke-Free Generation, Dr. Hanson served on MPAAT's original board of directors and as a board officer.

Dr. Hanson is retired as a practicing physician, but his work continues to benefit the health of Minnesotans everyday. He helped secure smoke-free indoor air, reduce tobacco advertising, increase tobacco prices, and increase access to cessation services. Together these will improve the lives of Minnesotans for generations to come.

When asked why he supports ANSR's work, Dr. Hanson replied: "I support ANSR because it was there in the beginning of a fifty-year movement to reduce the harm of tobacco products on Minnesotans. It is still intimately involved, countering the moves of an industry that continues to produce and aggressively promote products that are dangerous whether we smoke or vape or are innocent bystanders. I salute ANSR. Keep up this important work."
